

## **New Honorees for Red and Yellow**

Every year, HCASC selects noteworthy African Americans to represent the round robin divisions. For 2010, legendary cycling champion Major Taylor will represent the Red Division, while blues music innovator W. C. Handy, will represent the Yellow Division.




Marshall "Major" Taylor

Marshall "Major" Taylor was born in Indianapolis, Indiana on November 21, 1878. He received his first bicycle from the wealthy family that employed his father. He earned the nickname of "Major" because of the soldier's uniform he wore while performing cycling stunts for a bike shop in Indianapolis. Taylor won his first amateur race at the age of 13.

It wasn't long before he was competing in international races. In 1899, he reached the top of the cycling world by winning the world title in the 1-mile sprint. With that, he became the first African-American world champion in cycling (and only the second African-American world champion in any sport).

Taylor overcame open racism and overt threats of violence by those who did not want to see him succeed. Despite these challenges, he established several world records during his 16 years of competition. In the 168 races in which he competed, he finished first in 117 and second in 32.

To celebrate his achievements, the Major Taylor Velodrome in Indianapolis, one of the world's most renowned cycling venues, was named in his honor. He was posthumously inducted into the U.S. Bicycling Hall of Fame in 1989.



W. C. Handy

Born on November 16, 1873, in Florence, Alabama. William Christopher Handy is often called the "Father of the Blues" and is credited with helping popularize blues music. The son and grandson of ministers, he showed his love of music at an early age.

He wrote his first song in 1909—a campaign song called "Mr. Crump" for a candidate for mayor of Memphis. Later, that song would become famous as "Memphis Blues," the first published commercial blues song.

He published his next successful song, "St. Louis Blues" (1914), using his own company which was later known as Handy Brothers Music Company. Other Handy hit songs included Yellow Dog Blues (1914) and "Beale Street Blues" (1916).

In 1918, Handy moved his business to New York and later scored success with the composition "Aunt Hagar's Blues." He continued to promote blues to mainstream audiences in the 1920s, editing Blues: An Anthology (1926) and putting together the first blues performance in New York City's Carnegie Hall in 1928. Handy continued working steadily through the 1930s, publishing collections of African American music.
