Mooney is a New Orleans native who has twice been nominated for the Louisiana Governor's Arts Award. She has been featured in several museums, including the Autry Museum of Western Heritage and the African American Museum of Fine Art.

As the artist-in-residence at Bennett College, she teaches a class on creativity in concordance with Bennett's Returning Women Program. As part of Bennett's community service, she created the piece "A House is Not a Home..." for the East Greensboro Habitat for Humanity. She is currently working on a book commemorating the contribution of the Bennett Belles to the original sit-in at Woolworth's.
